

# Become a Part of FMCA History

A monument was erected in 1994 to honor the founding of the Family Motor Coach Association at Good Will-Hinckley. The monument sits at the edge of a green field just off Route 201 in Hinckley.

In 2001, nearly 500 engraved bricks and granite blocks were laid as a lasting tribute to individual members and chapters from around the country. Forming a plaza in front of the monument, the stones and landscaping enhance the stature of this historic landmark.

## The Legacy Continues

The next phase expands the brick and granite blocks pathway to encircle the planting beds around the central monument. Some FMCA members engrave their brick or granite stone with their name, FMCA membership number and state. Others engrave a stone in memory of a friend or loved one, or as a special gift. The proceeds from Phase II support the school's literacy efforts so members are also buying bricks to thank a favorite teacher, commend an author, or recognize an alma mater. Special orders are also considered.

Chapter stones are very popular. Good Will continues to make three sizes of stones available, the brick for \$60, the 6x12" granite for \$100, and the larger 12x12" specialized granite for \$250.

## About Good Will-Hinckley Homes & Schools for Boys & Girls

Good Will-Hinckley was founded in 1889 by the Reverend George W. Hinckley. Since its inception, the school has helped more than 6,000 children from across the country. The 2,500-acre campus is a community for boys and girls ages 12-21 years old. The campus offers 12 cottages to house the students, the Averill/Alfond Middle & High School, the Glenn Stratton Learning Center, a work program for students, as well as an Independent Living Program for older teens. As a total community, GWH also provides on-campus therapeutic intervention services, a resident chaplain, a museum, library, working farm, recreational Center, and numerous athletic fields.

## Directions to GWH and the FMCA Monument

Take Exit 133 (formerly Exit 36/Fairfield-Skowhegan) north of Waterville off I-95 which is 20 minutes north of Augusta. Turn north on Route 201 toward Skowhegan, and proceed about 5.5 miles. Good Will-Hinckley stretches for over a mile along this road.

The FMCA Monument is located diagonally across from the 'Bibby' Alfond Visitors Center. Best suggestion is to park at the Visitor's Center or along one of our roadways if you plan to visit the monument. Rt. 201 is very busy and parking on this road is not advised.

If you plan to stay overnight, please stop first at the Visitor's Center and a map and parking pass will be provided.
